

What is Þorrablót?

Þorrablót is an Icelandic midwinter festival that takes place in the month of Þorri, according to the Old Icelandic Calendar, which starts in late January and ends in late February. These festivals were started by Icelandic student associations in the latter half of the 19th century. The first one was reportedly organised by the Association of Icelandic Students in Copenhagen in 1873, originally to honour the Norse

god Thor, after whom the month is presumed to be named. Calling the feast a *blót* (a feast held in honor of a god in Norse paganism) makes clear the reference to pagan times, which many nationalists of the 19th century considered a golden age of Icelandic history.

The midwinter month of Þorri always begins on the Friday after January 19th. The midwinter feast Þorrablót was held to celebrate that winter is half over and we survived without starvation or serious illness.

The first day of Þorri is called *Bóndadagur* or "Husband's Day/Farmer's Day", *Góa* is the next month and always starts on a Sunday between 8 and 14 February.

The first day of *Góa* is called *Konudagur* "Womans day"

Still today, these days are celebrated in Iceland, and give a person a chance to be nice to someone of the opposite sex, your aunt, grandpa, or whoever you care for.





Where are the naughty ones?.....

There she was, caterwalling like a stabbed pig, swaggering towards bug-eyed, startled children - Grýla, in all her disheveled glory - hair matted, spiked in all directions; face distorted and smudged with dirt; eyes wild with fire; clothing tattered, torn; pots tied to her leg with bits of knotted rope - There she was, screeching at the top of her lungs, "Where are all the naughty children? - I'm hungry - I EAT naughty children."

Who was this apparition, this deranged phantom and what was she doing here at the ICCT annual Christmas party? This was Grýla, the cantankerous mother of

the 13 Christmas Lads, who had come down from the mountains - as she does every year - to tell the children that her 13 sons, the pranksters - would soon be visiting them again.

"If you believe in them, and you've been good, the Lads, my sons, won't do you no harm. Especially if you leave them treats. You know about putting out your shoe, don't you, starting on the night of December 11th and for the next 12 nights? If you put your shoe by the window, one of my lads will put a small surprise in it for you. If you've been bad, he'll leave a potato!"

"Enough of this for now - who wants to come with me to the sheep stable where I'll recite you a rhyme about my 1st lad who likes to chase sheep?"

So began actor, singer and teacher Edda Kristinsson's magical tour of Riverdale Farm. Following a lunch at a nearby restaurant, families are met there by Grýla who introduces her lads, one by one, as she leads her party, in Pied Piper fashion, from the sheep stable to the duck pond, past the cows and donkey, down deep into the valley. Along the way, Grýla voraciously licks a pot, a spoon and a bowl, as will her sons, each time offering the astounded children a chance to do the same. "How gross," says Valdi. "Ooh, yuck," echoes Freyja. "Grýla's awesome," pronounces Sami.

The last stop on the tour is by the horses where the children meet a character that is a combination of Candle Beggar and Santa Claus - a new mythical figure that has emerged from the blending of Icelandic and North American cultures.

By the end of the tour, the initially astonished and somewhat frightened children have become mesmerized and captured by the ancient stories. They have entered Grýla's world and compete to hold her pots and to have their turn at staggering with her staff.

Björk's Karaoke Marathon

From Iceland Review—The karaoke marathon launched by Björk and her campaign group The Voice of the Nation on Thursday spurred thousands of people to sign a petition where the Icelandic government is urged to prevent the acquisition of Icelandic energy company HS Orka by Canadian Magma Energy and review the policy on the ownership of natural resources.

More than 46,000 signatures have now been collected, which is much higher than the goal of 35,000 signatures which, according to Prime Minister Jóhanna Sigurdardóttir, was the minimum in order for the government to take the petition seriously.

“Just the simple notion for Canadian authorities that the fact that all the main investigative journalist sections want to move their operations to Iceland, maybe that will be an inspiration for the Canadian legislators to make sure that the working environment for Canadian journalists would be in such a way that they can do their work to report the stories that need to be told.” Said Ms. Jónsdóttir

For those who doesn't know, the Icelandic Modern Media Initiative legislation makes Iceland a global safe haven for whistleblowers and journalists.

This is the third time in a row that INL of NA, it's member clubs and individuals have sent money to Mæðrastyrksnefnd at Xmas. We sent 9,980.40, dollars to Iceland, since then we have received \$1,145 which will be sent shortly.

Money was shared between 5

Mæðrastyrksnefndir, in Reykjavík, Hafnarfjörður, Kópavogur, Akureyri and Akranes.

They were all deeply moved by the generosity of INL of North America and its member clubs and the individuals behind this outstanding gift.

They all report a considerable increase of allocations to families in need. Estimate is around 50 % increase so the "kreppa" is still there. These 5 Mæðrastyrksnefndir are estimated to be supporting about 1.300

families over the holidays. Mæðrastyrksnefndirnar are supporting poor families throughout the year with food and

clothing, and give special help over the Christmas holidays, to help needy families enjoy the Christmas spirit.

ICELANDIC NATIONAL**LEAGUE OF N.A.****Report to Clubs****By Garry Oddleifson***(former ICCT President)*

At the Nov. 4th INL/NA board meeting, it was suggested that a regular report of Icelandic National League of N.A. proceedings be sent to the clubs, so that it could be shared with all members.

When I first became involved with an Icelandic club in Toronto, in the late 1980's, it was a large, active group. We were only then being approached by the INL, which had decided (rightly so!) to reach out to clubs all over, so that the INL could become more inclusive. Like many fellow club members in Toronto at the time, I wondered how we would benefit from this involvement, and whether the financial cost was justified. I'm sure that this question has been asked repeatedly by many individual club members.

Speaking personally, I found out when I attended my first INL/NA conference, in Gimli in 1993, that the association was enough in itself, and I am happy to have expanded my involvement with others of Icelandic descent far beyond my involvement with the local club. I now am blessed with friends all over the continent, and realize that we share a deep interest in our heritage, which can often benefit from combined effort.

The recent suggestion that I report to you on behalf of the INL board will hopefully help you see that there is a benefit to your INL involvement. I only hope that I can get it right!

**INL/NA Report to Clubs -

The question of convention costs and financial responsibilities that host clubs need to assume was discussed. The current board understands this situation and is sympathetic with it. We are particularly concerned that smaller clubs will regretfully not offer to host. Brandon has expressed interest in hosting the 2012 convention, but will probably hesitate if left to face financial problems. So the INL/NA board voted in principal, to offer financial assurance to host clubs, if we participate in the budget planning, and monitor any budget changes. 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

Until 1995, it was legal by law to kill any Turkish person "on the spot" by any Icelandic civilian.

This law came into effect after the

"Tyrkjarán", 1627.

In fact the pirates were not Turkish, but Algerians and Morrocans, one of their leaders was also believed to be Murat Reis, an outlaw from the Netherlands.

When Iceland was hosting the World Cup in Handball in 1995, the old law was removed on request from Turkish authorities.
