KEIKO ENJOYS NEW SPACE

Keiko, the 5 tonne killer whale who starred in Free Willy, is enjoying his new-found freedom since his move to a much larger space. Little by little, Keiko has set out to explore the entire Klettsvík bay. The orca's new living space is 22 times larger than his old pen, which was about the size of a soccer field. Keiko can now interact with the ocean floor for the first time since his capture over 20 years ago.

Keiko still has to observe a "curfew" and is kept in the sea pen at night. The next step will be to teach the killer whale to forage for his own food. If all goes well, the animal's trainers hope to release the orca by this summer.

TIED BY BLOOD SCREENING

An enthusiastic crowd turned out for our screening of the documentary about David Arnason's search for information about his roots ... although illness prevented David himself from attending. Those present were very impressed with the haunting nature of the story about his great-grandmother who emigrated to Canada alone at age 17 to escape an unwanted betrothal, and died in childbirth three years later. What amazed everyone is how her Icelandic relatives kept her story alive 100 years later. Footage of the fog-enshrouded mountains and beautiful scenery of Iceland served to enhance the film. We liked it so much that we are looking into whether we can get copies to sell so that more people can share the experience.

In one of those "small Icelandic world" moments, Esther Broughton and Tryggvi Smith discovered that their families both came from the same small town in Saskatchewan - Tantallon! You never know who you'll meet when you come to an ICCT event!

Kristianna Gunnars in her Globe & Mail Review, says, "Wylie writes with ease and, true to the epistolary format, is conversational and casual. There are thoughtprovoking observations along the way, and the presence of the narrator, warm and positive, does actually, as she says in the last and best letter,

"hold up the light, keep the fire going."

New books include W.D. Valgardson's "Divorced Kids Club and other Short Stories", which earned him a Governor-General's Award nomination, and "Frances", which he describes as "the most Icelandic" of his books. This is his first full-length novel for young people and in it he brings all his strengths to bear - eccentric but engaging characters coming to terms with their differences, and a witty and acute observation of relationships, all interwoven with the magic, myth and history of Valgardson's own Icelandic heritage.

ICELANDIC PUPPETEER TO VISIT TORONTO

The Pocket Theatre was founded in 1984 by one of Iceland's leading puppeteers, Hallveig Thorlacius, with the purpose of telling old Icelandic stories she loved listening to as a child in her grandmother's kitchen. Iceland has always taken the role of the storyteller in Europe, ever since the first settlers came sailing from Norway in the Viking Age. Now the show "The World's Smallest Giant" has been chosen by the Leifur Eiriksson Millennium Commission of Iceland to introduce Icelandic folklore to American and Canadian audiences. Here in Toronto, it will be shown in local schools May 29th - 31st, and also at a special presentation for all of us on Sunday, May 28th, at the Thornhill Golf and Country Club in Thornhill. In addition, member Marian Johnson of London is looking into having a show there on Saturday, May 27th. So mark the dates on your calendar for this delightful show.

VIKINGS IN CANADA GALA TUESDAY, AUGUST 1, 2000 FUN, FILM AND FOOD ...

... but not forgetting the Virtuosity of our Viking descendants when it comes to literature, art and music. It's all going to be part of the show! Last time we told you about the music components of the show - now we'd like to introduce our writers and storyteller:

MAJA ARDAL spent seven seasons as Artistic Director of Young People's Theatre in Toronto and has now returned to her acting career while developing her other interest, writing. Born in Iceland and raised in Scotland before moving to Canada, Maja has taught at the National Theatre School, and directed plays at the Shaw Festival and the Grand Theatre among others. Her years at YPT were very successful, overseeing many successful ground-breaking productions and gaining much critical acclaim. Her latest project is a play set in northern Iceland in 1942 which is in development for presentation in 2001. She will be reading from it at the Gala.

DAVID ARNASON is a Winnipeg writer, editor and teacher. His works include two collections of poetry, four collections of short stories and two non-fiction works as well as five stage plays and numerous film scripts and radio plays. In addition, he has edited several books on Canadian writing and performed in reading tours throughout the U.S. and Europe. He is presently head of the Icelandic and English Departments at the University of Manitoba and has recently completed the documentary film Tied by Blood.

W.D. VALGARDSON received his education at the University of Manitoba and the University of Iowa. He is currently the Chairman of the Department of Creative Writing at the University of Victoria. He has written many articles for refereed journals and periodicals – books of poetry, short stories and novels – before turning his hand to children's literature. His many awards include the Mr. Christie Award for "Thor", the Books in Canada Award for "Gentle Sinners" as best first novel of the year, and a 1999 Governor General's Award nomination for "The Divorced Kids Club and Other Short Stories".

BETTY JANE WYLIE started her creative life as a poet, before turning to playwriting, journalism and non-fiction. She has published 35 books ranging over a wide area of interest and including biography, self-help, inspiration, cookbooks, plays, children's plays and puppet plays, belles lettres, poetry and financial planning. She was a founding member of the Periodical Writers' Association and the Playwrights' Union as well as Chair of the Writers' Union 1988-89. Her latest book, "Letters to

Icelanders", explores the theme of the relationship between present day Icelandic-Canadians and Iceland.

CAROL MCGIRR has a long history as a story-teller and has appeared at festivals across Canada including the Lunenburg Harbour Folk Festival and at the Toronto Festival for the last 21 years. She founded Fireside Epic which produces five concerts a year which deal with saga, myth and epic. She is particularly renowned for her telling of the Icelandic sagas.

This star-studded event takes place on August 1st at the Glenn Gould Theatre in the CBC Broadcast Centre, starting at 6:30 p.m. In our next issue of the newsletter, we'll tell you more about the other featured artists in the Gala. Reykjavik has been named one of the Cultural Cities of Europe ... their festival opened on January 29th. It has a varied agenda with about two hundred events, many of which extend abroad.

In addition, Iceland is celebrating the 1000th anniversary of the conversion of Iceland to Christianity, with about 130 events all around the country. The main event is the celebration at Thingvellir on July 1st and 2nd, but there are also other aspects, including the premiere of an opera in March, ecumenical festivals, outdoor festivals and much more.



NORTH AMERICA:

All over this country and the U.S.A., people are paying tribute to the 1000th anniversary of Leifur Eiriksson's arrival in North America - Iceland is sending many cultural envoys, including the Gudridur play (about the first European woman to give birth in North America), the Puppet Theatre, the Icelandic Symphony, choirs and dance groups. Wherever you travel this summer there'll be something interesting going on in the Icelandic community. And don't forget about the arrival of the replica Viking ship at L'Anse aux Meadows on July 28th, followed by our Kinmount Dedication Ceremony on July 31st and our Vikings in Canada Gala August 1st.

- APRIL 6, 2000 OPENING OF ICELANDIC CANADIAN MILLENNIUM CELEBRATIONS

On April 6th, 2000, Davíd Oddsson, The Prime Minister of Iceland, will present a statue of Gudridur Thorbjarnardottir as a gift from the people of Iceland to the Canadian nation. The Prime Minister of Canada, the Right Honourable Jean Chrétien, will accept this gift on behalf of Canada at the Museum of Civilization in Ottawa ON/Hull PQ.

Gudridur Thorbjarnardottir was the first European (Icelandic) woman to travel to North America, nearly 500 years before Christopher Columbus. Upon her arrival she gave birth to her son, Snorri Thorfinnsson – the first European child born in North America.

This event will mark the launch of the Icelandic Canadian Millennium Celebrations, which will include over a hundred events throughout Canada during this year. In attendance will be five hundred Ottawa school children, along with Icelandic Canadian astronaut Bjarni Tryggvason and Icelandic soprano soloist, Diddú.

More details of the celebrations come from David Gislason, Chair of the Millennium 125 Commission:

"The program now looks like this: April 6th, Grand Hall, Museum of Civilization, Hull, Quebec

10:00 am - ceremonies begin with singing of National anthems by "Diddú", Sigrún Hjámtýsdóttir

Prime Minister of Iceland, Davíð Oddsson will speak, and formally present the statue to the Canadian people. Prime Minister Jean Chretien will accept the statue, and will also speak. Bjarni Tryggvasson, Canadian astronaut, will speak to the assembled crowd, including 500 school children from the Ottawa - Hull area. I anticipate that Hon. John Harvard, and Sen Janis Johnson will be masters of ceremonies, and I will bring the formalities to a close on behalf of the Millennium 125 Commission.

10:45 am - formal ceremonies close, Prime Ministers and their retinue will take their leave to continue with their

meetings. Kathy Arnason will take over, to direct the balance of the program, the "birthday party".

It is our hope that you will all be able to attend this very significant event, I sincerely hope the change of date has not caused problems for you. Hope to see you in Ottawa-Hull"
